#### **Course Objectives:**

BFA Folio is a part of the Bachelor of Fine Arts professional development courses that are designed to prepare students for their BFA exhibition and entry into the professional art community. This course is designed to introduce topics through specific requirements that will prepare students for the transition from undergraduate school to active participation in the art world post graduation.

Goals: upon successful completion of this course students will:

- 1. Develop the skill necessary to document work in an appropriate and professional manner.
- 2. Research and become familiar with information sources which will be utilized to further ones access to artists opportunities both in state, nationally and internationally.
- 3. Begin to understand how to develop an artist's statement, resume and promotional package.
- 4. Present a slide talk or digital presentation of the student's personal work including pertinent historical and contemporary visual references.
- 5. Begin to research and contact potential internship opportunities.
- 6. Apply to one regional or national exhibitions. (while valid and reputable, local and UCA exhibits will not count towards this credit)

# Final grade for this course will be based upon:

A final "folio" to be handed in during class which must include:

- 1. 20 professional quality slides, properly masked and labeled with an accompanying slide list and CD
- 2. A list of 10 sources, 5 of which must be media specific that could be used to further research art opportunities (not to include those listed in the text)
- 3. A preliminary artists' statement
- 4. A preliminary resume
- 5. A list of 5 potential internship opportunities at least one of which must be out of state, with

supporting documentation from each

- 6. Documentation of juried show application to include a copy of the entry form, exhibition information and outcome.
- 7. A list of 5 exhibitions or art events attended throughout the semester and a brief essay as to how each was utilized to influence your studio practice and/or your professional development. (You are responsible for remembering this component of the folio, it will not be covered in class)

## \*\*It is required that the presentation of the folio be of a professional quality\*\*

Goals: Upon the successful completion of this course students will

- 1. Research and apply for an internship that will challenge the student, build the resume and fulfill the 4390 internship component of the BFA degree
- 2. Write a successful BFA problem proposal
- 3. Research the variety of opportunities available post graduation
- 4. Prepare an application and "package" in preparation for applying to graduate school, residencies, or jobs (this is to include at a minimum: a resume, artist statement, cover letter, 20 images see page 120 and/or296 in the Lazzari text).
- 5. Apply to two exhibitions both must be juried and one must be national
- 6. Present a slide talk or digital presentation of the students' personal work including pertinent historical and contemporary visual references.

# **Evaluation:**

Final grade for this course will be based upon:

A final "folio" to be handed in during class on November 1 and again on November 29 which must include:

- 1. An Artists' "Package" to include an application to a pertinent post graduate institution and all required supporting material (this is to include at a minimum and may vary depending on the application type: a resume, artist statement, cover letter, 20 images see page 120 and/or296 in the Lazzari text). Presented in the most professional manner.
- 2. A 4390 proposal to include contact information for each internship opportunity
- 3. A BFA Problem proposal presented in the required format established by the UCA Department of Art
- 4. Documentation of two juried show applications to include a copy of the entry form, exhibition information and outcome.

- 5. A list of 5 exhibitions or art events attended throughout the semester and a brief essay as to how each was utilized to influence your studio practice and/or your professional development. (You are responsible for remembering these as they will not be covered in class)
- 6. Final Folio to include all of the above (including but not limited to, a resume, artist's statement, **20** images in slide and digital format)

(will be returned), and your final problem report with slides (will not be read)

- To meet with the Baum Gallery director 1-3 times prior to the BFA exhibition for information and basic training regarding art handling, installation, and orientation to installing the senior exhibit.
