Trustee Polk made the motion that the college purchase forty Choir robes at a total cost of \$987.50 from the Collegiate Cap and Gown Company, Champaign, Illinois. Trustee Sneed seconded the motion which was passed unanimously.

Trustee Sneed made the motion that the following resignations be accepted:

Mrs. Hugh Williamson, Assistant Hostess in McAlister Hall, as of January 18, 1956, because of illness.

Chester B. Ainsworth, Associate Professor of Industrial Education.
(On leave without pay at the present time)

and that the following persons be employed:

Mrs. Marjorie Meyers, Co-Hostess in McAlister Hall at a salary of \$100.00 per calendar month plus room and board, as of Feb. 3, 1956.

Dr. Wilson Ashby to teach in Graduate School for the two summer terms of 1956 at \$120.00 per week - ten weeks - dept. of Business Education.

Miss Edna Joyce Seay, Secretary in the Dean's Office, at a salary of \$150.00 per calendar month as of February 6, 1956 - to be paid from Ford funds through June 30, 1956.

Trustee Morgan seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

Trustee Adkisson made the motion that President Silas D. Snow of Arkansas State Teachers College be authorized in behalf of the college to sign a lease with the Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army, for the use of the old infirmary building up to five years at \$100.00 per month. Trustee Polk seconded the motion and it was passed unanimously.

Upon the motion of Trustee Polk, seconded by Trustee Sneed and subsequently passed by unanimous vote, the following criteria for faculty rank were formally adopted by the Board:

FACULTY RANK

To be promoted from instructor to assistant professor:

- 1. have an M.A. Degree and hold the rank of instructor for three years and earn a minimum of 12 semester hours of graduate credit above the M.A.
- 2. have an M.A. and hold the instructor's rank for two years and to have earned 30 hours above the M.A.
- 3. have a PhD and hold the instructor's rank for one year.
- 4. publication of professional articles may be accepted by the administration as just cause for promotion in rank.
- 5. shall give evidence of institutional usefulness and show ability to do scholarly work.

To be promoted from assistant professor to associate professor:

- hold an M.A. degree and earn 30 additional hours and hold the rank of assistant professor for five years.
- 2. to have earned a doctorate and held the assistant professor's rank for 3 years.
- 3. to have produced a professional publication that is deemed worthy of special consideration of the college administration.
- 4. shall give evidence of institutional usefulness and show ability to do scholarly work.

To be promoted from associate professor ro professor:

- to have held the rank of associate professor for five years and to obtain the doctorate.
- 2. to attain the assignment as Head of a Department and have the doctorate.
- to have produced a professional publication that is deemed worthy of special consideration by the college administration.
- 4. shall give evidence of institutional usefulness and show ability to do scholarly work.
