

The Board of Trustees of the Arkansas State Normal met in Conway Friday August 2nd, 1918 with the following members present: Bond, Oliver, McDaniel, Lenon, Hutchins. Absent, Frauenthal and Dunaway.

Mr. Torreyson was authorized to have boiler at power plant so repaired as to get the most efficient service therefrom. This work to include addition to smokestack if necessary, new door made in brick wall of plant for purpose of raking flues and also iron door in boiler and anything else needful to make the plant more efficient.

The secretary was authorized to advertise for bids for heating plans of according to Architect Almand, with the exception of the radiation recommended and also with the requirement that the pipes be wrapped. Bids to be asked for with radiation and wrapping and without wrapping. Said bids to be submitted by noon August 12th, 1918.

The secretary was authorized to address a letter to contractor Donaghey informing him that satisfactory progress was not being made on new building and telling him that building must be completed and ready for occupancy by Sept. 15th or legal steps would be taken to compel enforcement of contract and for damages thereon.

A committee composed of Oliver, Bond and Torreyson was appointed to select registrar and report its finding at next meeting for confirmation.

The secretary of the board was directed to address a letter to the state Auditorial board asking for an audit of the books of the Normal.

The following recommendations by Mr. Torreyson for the election of additional teachers and increases in salaries were adopted and ordered made:

I beg leave to make the following recommendations as to selections of teachers and employes for the school year beginning September 1st, 1918.

Miss Minnie Snellins-Assistant in Science -Salary \$116.66 a mo.

Miss-----Caraher-Instructor in Music & Reading \$85.45 a mo.

Miss Dorothy Pyle-Teacher of Piano----Salary fees at old rate.

Pete Weiseman----Farmer -----\$70.00 a mo--Old salary \$60.00 a mo.

Emil Fabolz-----Gardener-----\$60 a mo--Old salary \$50.00

Mrs. Josie Hildreth -Housekeeper-----70 a mo--Old Salary 50.00.

Mrs. B. W. Torreyson-Matron-----60. a mo--- Old Salary--50.

The general increase in the cost of everything as well as the scarcity of labor of all kinds had made it necessary to raise the wages of all employes at the dormitory as follows.

Head cook from \$40.00 to \$50.00

Asst. Cook from \$30. to \$35.00

Two Waiters from \$25.00 to \$35.00

One maid from \$25.00 to \$30.00.

Porter \$25.00. same.

Since April two young lady students have been employed as maids instead of the one colored maid as before. Each one of them is given her board at the dormitory at \$15.00 a month and \$7.50 in money. As an inducement to students to take over work the two referred to were given also their registration fee in the summer school.
