Smith to Lead Honors College



Dr. Patricia Smith will serve as Interim Dean of the Schedler Honors College for the 2017-18 academic year. Dr. Smith has been with UCA since 2004, with the Honors College since 2005, and has served as Assistant Dean of the Honors College since 2014. She holds a faculty position in Leadership Studies and has her doctorate from the University of Arkansas at Little Rock in Higher Education Administration. Dr. Smith has published numerous articles on the growth and evolution of honors education and on improving honors. She retention in made significant contributions to the instrument currently being used by the National Collegiate Honors Council (NCHC) for assessing and evaluating honors programs and colleges. Dr. Smith has delivered 20 national and international presentations within the honors community and has served on multiple occasions as a consultant to other honors programs. She is an NCHC-certified program reviewer and serves as the chair of the NCHC Research Committee, and as a member on NCHC's Assessment and Evaluation Committee. Dr. Smith is responsible for the creation of the selection and admission process that has been used in the Honors College for the past 11 years. She was instrumental in beginning the Honors mentor and ambassador programs and, last year, led the faculty through a process of refining the mission of the Honors College to focus on empowering students to guide socially responsible change.

Apple Educators

Dr. Victoria Groves-Scott, College of Education Dean, and Dr. Donna Wake, College of Education Associate Dean, have been accepted into the nationally recognized Apple Distinguished Educator (ADE) Program's Class of 2017. Drs. Groves-Scott and Wake are among only 130 educators selected this year in the United States from a pool of over 1,300 to join the more than 2,000 educators worldwide who are passionately committed to the improvement of teaching and learning through educational technology. Both will participate in a professional development academy in Houston, Texas, in July 2017.

UCA is proud to be one of the few institutions of higher education that has three ADEs, as Drs. Groves-Scott and Wake join Dr. Michael Mills from the Department of Teaching and Learning. Under Dr. Mills's leadership, the College of Education began an iPad 1:1 mobile initiative last year that is designed to transform the College of Education classrooms to reflect the new reality where places of learning are becoming increasingly democratized and students expect engagement and increased ownership of the classroom experience. The College of Education's iPad initiative has included significant faculty professional development, faculty coaching on innovative pedagogy using the iPads, ongoing program evaluation, and a renewed commitment to student success and achievement.

The Apple Distinguished Educator (ADE) Program began in 1994, when Apple recognized K-12 and higher education pioneers who are using a variety of Apple products to transform teaching and learning in powerful ways. Today it has grown into a worldwide community of over 2,000 visionary educators and innovative leaders who are doing amazing things with technology in and out of the classroom.
