COLLEGE? YES! BUT WHERE!

The young man or the young woman who upon graduation from high school has decided to go to college in order to better fit himself or herself for the privilege of living and serving in the modern world has first of all to decide which college to attend. Before reaching a decision as to whether or not he should choose any certain institution of higher learning the high school graduate who is wise will demand answers to a number of questions:

- 1. Will the college in question give me the assistance I desire and need in preparing for my life work?
- : 2. Is the college in question qualified to give me this needed help and training?
- 3. Is the atmosphere and environment under which the college does its work such as to bring me pleasure and enjoyment while I am pursuing my studies, thereby contributing to better effort on my part?
- 4. What is the expense of attending this college? Will I be able to meet it without burdening myself to a degree that will interfere with my duty to myself and to the members of my family?


It is the purpose of this bulletin to give the young men and women of this state information that will enable them to answer the foregoing questions insofar as the Arkansas State Teachers College, at Conway, Arkansas, is concerned. After you have read it should you decide to enroll at our institution we shall give you the best welcome of which we are capable. Should you choose another college we want you to know that our best wishes for your future happiness and success go with you.

I. Will I Be Able to Get the Courses and Training I Desire and Need at A. S. T. C.?

The Arkansas State Teachers College offers:

- (1) A four years curriculum in the Liberal Arts. This is sometimes referred to as the general Arts and Sciences course. It leads to the degree of Bachelor of Science or Bachelor of Arts, the same degrees granted by any standard liberal arts college.
- (2) Twelve different curricula designed for the training of those who desire to become teachers, each offering preparation in some specified teaching field, and all leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Education.
- (3) The following Pre-Professional Courses: Pre-Medical Course; Pre-Dental Course; Pre-Law Course; the first year of Pharmacy, and the first two years of Engineering.






- (4) Special Courses in Piano, Voice, Violin, Expression and Art.
- (5) Over 380 different courses distributed among the following fields: Agriculture; Art; Biological Science; Chemistry; Economics; Education; English and Literature; Expression; French; Geography; Government; German; History; Home Economics; Industrial Arts; Latin; Mathematics; Music; Physics; Physical Education; Psychology and Sociology.

II. Is A.S.T.C. Qualified to Give the Help and Training I Desire?

(1) The Arkansas State Teachers College has been accorded national recognition as a college of liberal arts by being admitted as a full member to the North Central Association of Colleges.

(2) The Arkansas State Teachers College



(3) The college plant consists of eight modern and well equipped buildings, the total valuation of which approximates three-quarters of a million dollars. Included in these are thoroughly equipped laboratories and a splendid library containing a large and well selected list of books and periodicals.

(4) The college faculty is made up of over forty well trained specialists, men and women holding doctors and masters degrees from the best and largest universities in America, and includes a number who have studied abroad.

(5) A report issued by the University of Arkansas for 1931-32 shows that students who transferred to the university from A. S. T. C. made a higher grade average than that made by students transferred from any other college in the state.

(6) Graduates of A. S. T. C. have made good and received



higher degrees from Columbia University, the University of Missouri, the University of Iowa, University of Colorado, University of Arkansas, and many other leading universities of the country.

Credits earned at A. S. T. C. stand the test.

III. Will I Enjoy My Student Days at A.S.T.C.?

The management of the Arkansas State Teachers College believes that students must find their college life enjoyable if they are to profit greatly by their attendance here. Hence college life at A. S. T. C. means much more than work in the classrooms, library, and laboratories. It means also pleasant and comfortable housing, recreation and sport, fun, and well organized and wholesome social life.

Housing Facilities


The college is able to offer unusually good housing facilities for its students. For women there is the new residence hall which is to be completed during the fall of 1933. It stands in a grove of beautiful oaks in the southeast corner of the campus. Modern and fireproof, when finished it will be one of the most complete buildings of its kind. It is being constructed along beautiful architectural lines, of brick and stone, and will consist of a basement and three stories. It will accommodate 124 young women. In it every provision is made for study, and for student progress; and no conveniences are omitted which are necessary to comfort and enjoyment. It will be used largely to centralize the social life of the college. Consequently on its first floor are to be found a number of very attractive reception rooms, two banquet rooms, and a large dining hall which will seat 400. The service will be under the direction of skilled dietitians, and meals will be served not only to the boarding students, but to other students as well whenever they so desire.

For Men. Upon the completion of the new residence half for women the present girls' dormitory, Doyne Hall, will be

converted into a dormitory for men. About 100 men are to be accommodated here. It is being made absolutely modern. Appropriate and sufficient lounging rooms and recreation halls are being provided so as to make the building a desirable home for men.

Until the building program is completed women students will be housed in Doyne Hall, and board for men can be secured in homes near the campus at a reasonable rate.

Extra-Curricular Activities:

Athletics—Athletics for both men and women are provided and encouraged. Intercollegiate contests in football, basket ball, track, baseball and tennis, as well as intra-mural engagements in the same sports loom large in student life. Jerry Dalrymple, Tulane's All-American player, has been employed as coach and will assume his duties on September 1, 1933. A complete program of instruction and guidance in physical education is already in operation.





Dramatics—Not only is instruction in dramatic art provided but a Little Theatre organization exists which furnishes an opportunity for those enjoying dramatic effort to develop it through the production of a number of plays during the year.

Debating—The college debating teams hold an enviable record. Each year they participate in a number of inter-collegiate contests and tournaments. Last year a debater from this college, John Robert Russell, won first place as best individual debater in the state tournament; and a men's team from this college won second place at a tournament in which 38 teams from Texas, Oklahoma, Missouri and Arkansas colleges were participants.

Publications—The Echo, student newspaper, gives actual experience to students interested in journalism. During the past three years it has been awarded first place once and second place twice among the college papers of the state by the college press association. The Scroll, the college annual, won first place among the college annuals of Arkansas in 1932.

Musical Activities: A choir, various choral clubs, and

glee clubs, as well as an orchestra and string ensemble bave proved enjoyable organizations for those with musical talent. The organization of a college band is being projected.

Honor Societies: Scholarship is rewarded by admitting the upper tenth of the Junior and Senior Classes to the Phil R. Clugston Chapter of the Scholarship Societies of the South, which has been established on the A. S. T. C. campus. Zeta Chapter of Lambda Delta Lambda is a branch of a national organization to further the interests of the highest ranking majors in the field of physical science. In the field of history a simliar organization is the Mu Chapter of Phi Alpha Theta. Other national fraternities having chapters at A. S. T. C. are Alpha Psi Omega in the field of dramatics and Alpha Tau Alpha, a national agricultural education fraternity. Alpha Beta Mu is the music fraternity and Sigma Beta Lambda is a Home Economics sorority.

Social Fraternities and Sororities:

To use the words of George Ade "if you have never been hamburged by a real live college fraternity" then you should see the men's fraternities on this campus at work. There are four of them: Kappa Phi Sigma; Chi Nu; Phi Lambda Chi, and Zeta Phi Delta.





These groups provide amusement for the men students, broaden the social experiences of the men, seek to promote the best interests of the college, and serve as a link to bind their alumni to the institution. Among the women there are four sororities seeking to serve a like purpose: Sigma Tau Theta; Alpha Phi Epsilon; Delta Phi Delta; and Beta Phi Gamma.

Departmental Clubs such as the French Club, the Art Club, the Classical Club, the Science Club, and others also exist under the sponsorship of the departments whose students they are designed to serve.

OTHER EXPENSES
