- LINCOLN. Artist/Date: Avard Fairbanks/1954.

Monuments located at Lincoln's New Salem, Petersburg, Illinois. Owner/Agent: The State of Illinois/Illinois Historic Preservation Agency. Description: Two cast bronze sculptures, one an equestrian (15' H), one a standing figure (9' H). Treatment: The sculptures were selectively cleaned, to remove light corrosion products yet keeping traces of original patination. The sculptures were given a partial chemical patina to visually unify the surfaces, followed by a protective coating of Incralac.

- MOZART. Artist/Date: Olin H. Warner/1898.

Public Sculptures located in Buffalo, New York. Owner: The City of Buffalo. Description: Cast Bronze sculptures. Treatment: Corrosion products were removed from the surface of the sculptures. Casting flaws were corrected for THE SPIRIT OF WOMANHOOD. New bronze plaques were modeled and cast for MOZART, using early photograhs of the monument as a guide. The sculptures were repatinated and given a protective coating of Incralac.

Treatment: The sculptures, all having received conservation treatment previously, were given routine maintenance treatment per the initial conservators' recommendations as part of cyclical preservation treatment.

Not Known (France)/1741. Owner: Illinois Historic Preservation Agency. Description: Bronze bell, cast in France and gifted by the King of France to the French colony at Kaskaskia, Illinois, for use in the original parish church. Treatment: Mud and a tightlyadhering layer of corrosion products were removed using fine brass brushes on a flexible shaft machine; the bell was given a protective lacquer coating; the wrought iron clapper was removed, layers of paint were taken off with paint stripper, and active rust was stabilized with tannic acid; the clapper was then replaced in the bell.

CENTAUR - Buffalo, New York. Artist/Date: Charles Cary Rumsey/cast 1930's. Owner: The City of Buffalo. Description: Over-life sized cast bronze equestrian sculpture. Treatment: The upper section of the bow was not original to the sculpture; a new one was modeled based on old photographs of the sculpture and of the artist's maquettes; bow being cast in bronze and will be attached in 1997; a new pedestal was designed for the sculpture, proportions based on the artist's clay sketches; oversaw removal and storage of sculpture during work on the foundation; in 1996 corrosion products were removed from the bronze, and the sculpture was repatinated based on artist's bronze model.

1992 - Present VOLKER FOUNTAIN/"ST. MARTIN AND THE BEGGAR"

- Kansas City, Missouri. Artist/Date: Carl Milles/dedicated 1958.

Owner: The City of Kansas City. Description: Larger-than-life-size bronze figure group: equestrian, beggar, and two angels. Treatment: Disassembled and oversaw the removal of the sculpture for storage, to allow major construction work on the site. Structural work needed on the anchoring system of the equestrian; designed and fabricated an anchoring system for the sculpture. Currently replacing missing and damaged details, using molds generated by the Millesgården in Sweden. Following reassembly of the sculpture, the patina will be touched up as necessary with pigmented wax, and a protective coating will be spray applied.

Description: Cast bronze sculptures. Treatment: Extensive maintenance work was carried out on all of the sculptures: corrosion products were removed locally; cleaned areas were chemically repatinated to blend with the existing patina, and further reintegrated with pigmented wax and/or inpainted; all bronze surfaces were given spray applications of a protective coating. A missing bird was recreated for the Saint Francis sculpture, based on old photographs. The bird was cast in bronze, attached by welding, and chemically patinated to blend with the rest of the sculpture.

1993 BELL from the U.S.S. ARIZONA - U.S.S. Arizona Memorial, Honolulu, Hawaii. Owner: National Park Service. Date: 1916.

Description: One of two original bells from the battleship Arizona, this bell was a working ship's bell from 1916 onwards. The bell is made of cast bronze, and measures approximately 3 feet high x 3 feet wide (widest dimension). **Treatment:** Several previous coatings of thick, deteriorated wax were removed with a solvent. Corrosion products were locally removed using fine brushes on a flexible shaft machine. After discussion with the curatorial staff, the bell was polished by hand to approximate the shine it would have had while in service. A protective coating was spray applied to the bronze.

1991 - 1993 ABRAHAM LINCOLN TOMB - Springfield, Illinois.

Artist/Date: Larkin Mead/c. 1870. Owner: The State of Illinois;

Description: Colossal granite obelisk with monumental bronze sculpture groups.

Treatment: Maintenance of the four outdoor bronze figure groups, originally treated in 1981: Localized removal of corrosion products; adjustment of patina; reapplication of the protective coating.

Condition Survey of the Oceanic, Pre-Columbian, and African Collections (8 months). Survey funded by IMS Conservation Grant, awarded August 1991.

Description: Antique wooden carousel; 40 carved and painted figures and 48 painted scenery panels. **Project:** 1988-1989: Condition Survey and Treatment Proposal.

Treatment: Conservation treatment of painted scenery panels -- stabilized flaking paint; removed discolored varnish and overpaint; applied isolation varnish; inpainted; applied final protective varnish.

1991 - 1992 EBBETS FIELD CORNERSTONE - Cooperstown, New York.

Date: 1912. Owner: National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum.

Description: Cornerstone to Ebbets Field Baseball Stadium, made of a fine-grained, red/brown sandstone. **Treatment:** Consolidated the spalling and fragile areas of the stone; cleaned the stone, removing oily dirt and graffiti.

1991 - 1992 GASLIGHT FIXTURES, DAVID DAVIS MANSION - Bloomington, Illinois. Owner: State of Illinois. Artist/Manufacturer/Date: Cornelius

& Sons/c. 1872. **Description:** 48 ornate painted and lacquered brass and zinc gaslight fixtures. **Treatment:** Phase I, a pilot study on 3 fixtures, to develop a treatment plan; completed in 1991; Phase II, treatment of the remaining fixtures: dismantled the fixtures; cleaned surface grime and removed non-original coatings; repaired broken parts; consolidated deteriorated coatings; cleaned metal; inpainted losses in surface finishes; rewired the fixtures to code; reinstalled the original fitters; applied a final protective surface finish.

1990 - 1991 JAPANESE EAGLE - Kansas City, Missouri. Artist/Date: Not known

(Japanese)/late 19th - early 20th c. Owner: The City of Kansas City.

Description: Monumental cast bronze sculpture of an eagle with a wingspan of 14 feet. **Treatment:** Disassembled sculpture; removed previous damaged and unasthetic repairs, designed and constructed internal armature, repaired individual sections of the eagle, replaced missing parts; removed corrosion products from all bronze surfaces, applied a historically correct chemical patina, applied a protective coating to the bronze.

1990 LAUMEIER SCULPTURE PARK - Saint Louis, Missouri.

Conservation Assessment of indoor and outdoor facilities; wrote detailed Treatment Proposals for sculpture in concrete, steel, and aluminum, as application for IMS Conservation Grant; Grant awarded August 10, 1990.

1989 INDIAN HUNTER - Buffalo, New York. Owner: City of Buffalo,

New York. Artist/Date: J.Q.A. Ward/1865 & 1926.

Description: Cast bronze, over life-size figure of young hunter with a dog.

Treatment: Bow and arrow were missing; these were duplicated in bronze by taking a mold from another copy of same statue; removed corrosion products from the surface of the bronze, chemically patinated the bronze according to historical research, applied protective coating to the bronze.

1989 STEPHEN A. DOUGLAS TOMB - Chicago, Illinois. Owner: State of Illinois. Artist/Date: Leonard W. Volk/1881. Description: 90-foot granite column on a granite, marble, and limestone tomb/pedestal; colossal bronze figure on column; 4 allegorical figures and 4 bronze reliefs on lower level; marble bust and sarcophagus inside tomb. Treatment: Removed corrosion products from the bronze; repatinated bronzes according to appearance of well-preserved indoor sculpture by the same artist; applied protective coating to the bronze surfaces; cleaned, desalinated, and consolidated the marble bust and sarcophagus; constructed new nose for the bust, based upon other portraits of Douglas by Volk.
