ASUN Conference Membership – Board Policy No. 800 & 804

The University of Central Arkansas has received an invitation to join the ASUN athletic conference effective as of July 1, 2021. This invitation was one of several options our program was presented with in the fallout from Covid-19 and college athletics conferences. Five of the current Southland Conference members will be departing the conference by 2022. UCA was aware that a move was necessary and, after deciphering the benefits of all options, the ASUN proved to be the best for UCA. The athletic department believes that this conference change will

place UCA with like-minded, comparable, public, football-playing programs, as well as established non-football playing brands. The television markets to the east of the university are very valuable to UCA's recruiting base for student-athletes and students. The athletic department is excited about this new opportunity and has decided to make the move this summer rather than wait until next summer.

The new member agreement, in part, specifies that the application fee is \$5,000 and the annual dues for the conference are \$55,000 per year. The annual dues are comparable to Southland Conference dues (\$52,000), and the annual revenue distribution will be more than the Southland Conference distribution (approximately \$1.2 million this year). Because the new member agreement is substantially the same for multiple schools, the UCA contract rider is not incorporated into the agreement.

Board Policy 800, Role of Athletic Programs, has been revised to remove the reference to the Southland Conference and provide that the Board of Trustees fully supports compliance with ASUN Conference policies. Board Policy 804 has also been revised to eliminate the reference to the Southland conference with regard to ticket prices. The language to be deleted is stricken through, and language to be added is highlighted.

The board unanimously adopted the following resolution upon motion by E.C. Maltbia and second by Joe Whisenhunt:

"BE IT RESOLVED: That the Board of Trustees approves the revisions to Board Policy 800 and Board Policy 804 set forth above and as attached to this resolution, and the changes set forth shall be effective from and after July 1, 2021.

The Board of Trustees adopts the following statement of the role of athletic programs for the University of Central Arkansas:

Varsity and intramural athletic programs play a significant role at the University of Central Arkansas. They provide students with valuable extra-curricular activities and other individuals and groups with an important sense of community.

Individuals who participate in collegiate athletics must be, first and foremost, students, subject to the same privileges and requirements as other students. As members of the university community, they should not be segregated by policy or practice from others in the student body, in housing accommodations or otherwise. Athletic events and activities should, to the extent possible, be scheduled to avoid conflict with academic programs and requirements.

Although athletic programs may open professional opportunities for some students, the recreational and social aspects should predominate at the varsity level. The university and its athletic programs should avoid excessive emphasis upon winning and should give all students reasonable opportunities to participate in either varsity or intramural events.

Athletic programs are significant activities for all segments of the university community, and each segment may be appropriately involved in various aspects of their operations. In all instances, however, the university should ensure that rules and regulations are scrupulously followed and that the programs and activities are consistent with the university's academic mission.

The Board of Trustees retains responsibility for the policies under which athletic programs operate, and the president is primarily responsible for administration. However, the faculty, staff and students should also be closely involved in the development of policy and in the periodic review of program operations.

Administrative structures which would allow athletic programs to operate outside the university's normal rules and procedures of governance should not be allowed to develop. The focus of the programs should be upon the university community rather than upon entertainment of large audiences unaffiliated with the university.

The Board of Trustees fully supports compliance with all NCAA, Southland ASUN Conference and university policies.

Ticket prices to university athletic events shall be determined by the athletic director, with final approval by the president. The prices shall be reviewed on an annual basis and may be adjusted to reflect current financial conditions. Factors to consider when adjusting ticket prices may include,

but are not limited to, the following: (1) ticket prices to other Southland Cconference athletic events; (2) economic state of potential patrons; (3) supply and demand; (4) quality of a particular event; etc.

Reimbursement of Expenses for Official Board of Trustees Duties - Board Policy No. 211

Arkansas Code Annotated 25-16-901 et seq. provides that boards and commissions may, during their first regularly scheduled meeting of each calendar year, authorize expense reimbursement for each board member for performing official board duties. The law states that the expense reimbursement must not exceed the rate established by state travel regulations for state employees. The law covers expense reimbursement for all board functions. This action is consistent with Board Policy No. 211, Reimbursement of Expenses for Official Board of Trustees Duties, and Arkansas Code Annotated 6-67-102.

Deletion of Listed Associate Degrees – Board Policy No. 321

The administration has determined that the Criminal Justice Institute Higher Education Partnership programs should be deleted. No students have enrolled in the programs in the last 10 years. The deletion of these programs is included in the notifications and deletions section of this agenda.

Deletion of these programs requires a change in Board Policy 321, since two of the deleted programs are listed in Board Policy 321 as requiring more than 60 semester credit hours. The two programs to be removed are the AAS in Crime Scene Investigation and the AAS in Law Enforcement Administration.

UNIVERSITY OF CENTRAL ARKANSAS REASON FOR REQUIRING BOARD REVIEW AND ACTION (Board Policy No. 416)

Contract exceeds \$250,000 or with a term of more than one year

1. Vendor/Party: Aramark Educational Services, LLC.

Amount: The average rate increase for meal plans is 3.9%.

Summary of Contract Information: The purpose of the agreement is to provide food services for the campus. Under the terms of the contract, Aramark and UCA mutually agree upon an appropriate increase to the meal plan rates, utilizing the most recent twelve-month increases in the October Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U). The October 2020 CPI-U was 3.9%. Factors that contributed to the rate increase this year include the increase in minimum wage and additional costs associated with the COVID-19 pandemic.

Term: The Board of Trustees approved the original contract in April 2012. The contract was effective June 1, 2012, and is renewable for up to ten years. The Board most recently approved a revision in December 2020.

2. Vendor/Party: Blackboard, Inc.

Amount: Approximately \$1,200,000.

Summary of Contract Information: Blackboard is an existing vendor. In 2018, the university signed a two-year contract that combined Blackboard Learn, Collaboration, and Managed hosting services into one contract. In October 2019, the university signed a six-year agreement that expanded services to include Blackboard Ultra in their SaaS environment. This amendment adds an additional model called Ally, which assists with making videos, documents, and programs more accessible to individuals with disabilities.

Term: March 1, 2021, to June 30, 2026.

3. Vendor: EAB Global, Inc.

Amount: Approximately \$3,600,000.

Summary of Contract Information: EAB is an existing vendor. In June 2018, the university signed a five-year agreement that added additional services to provide student marketing, recruitment, and enrollment services. Since that time, the university has decided to obtain additional services and EAB has acquired several companies that were providing other services to the university. This agreement will consolidate the existing services into one agreement and add the additional services desired by the university.

Term: July 1, 2021, to June 30, 2025.

Request for Capital Project Approval – Doyne Health Sciences Center

In 2018, the Board of Trustees authorized the administration to proceed with the planning, design, and construction of the Integrated Health Sciences Building. As part of the initial bond issue approved in December 2018, approximately \$1.3 million was set aside with the intention of

renovating Doyne Health Sciences Center. The enhanced design is necessary to meet the needs of the larger program cohorts in the various health related disciplines.

The initial design changes for the three-story, 68,235 square-foot building have been developed. If approved, the next steps will be to engage an architect, contractor, and other entities necessary to facilitate the Doyne remodel project.

The board unanimously adopted the following resolution upon motion by Curtis Barnett and second by Bunny Adcock:

"BE IT RESOLVED: That the Board of Trustees hereby authorizes the administration to proceed with the planning, design, and renovation of the Doyne Health Sciences Center for the purpose of providing specialized areas for instruction of programs.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the Board of Trustees authorizes the administration to execute documents, enter into contracts, and take such other steps as may be necessary to facilitate the above specified project."

Fees - Room and Board - Board Policy No. 632

The **current** room and board rate is \$7,554 per year (based on a double-occupancy room and the Total Access meal plan with \$100 declining cash balance "DCB").

The **recommended** increase for the Total Access meal plan as reported by ADHE is **4.55%**; however, the **average** increase for all meal plans is **3.31%**. The increase in the board plans should generate an additional \$268,548 overall, based on pre-pandemic usage. These funds will be available to help cover the 3.9% increase in the Aramark contract and allow for necessary service enhancements and upgrades. The Department of Housing and Residence Life completed a review of board plan rates from public institutions within the state. The proposed 2021-22 board plan rates continue to place UCA in the lower half of the 2020-21 price range for other Arkansas universities.

A **4.5%** increase is recommended for **room** rates. This increase is primarily related to the continuing effort to maintain and upgrade housing facilities. Recommended repairs to the residence halls and university-owned apartments exceed \$10 million. The estimated annual revenue from the proposed increase for the housing room rates, based on pre-pandemic occupancy, is \$674,963. The proposed 2021-22 room rates place UCA near the midpoint of the current 2020-21 rates for other Arkansas universities.

The proposed **room and board** rate for 2021-22 is \$7,896 per year, based on double-occupancy room and the Total Access meal plan with \$200 DCB, for an overall increase of **4.52%**. This increase will result in a student paying an additional **\$342** per year. At this time, projected occupancy in housing and use of meal plans is uncertain due to the unknown nature of the pandemic.

The proposed schedule of room and board rates was presented to the Student Government Association (SGA) at their February 1, 2021, meeting.

The nightly rate (double/single) used for camps, conferences and other nightly stays will increase from \$17/\$25 to \$20/\$28. The additional revenue will help cover the added maintenance, cleaning and staffing required.

The board unanimously adopted the following resolution upon motion by Joe Whisenhunt and second by Terry Fiddler:

NOTIFICATIONS AND DELETIONS

<u>Notification: New Programs in Applied Data Analytics: Technical Certificate, Bachelor of Science, and Master of Science</u>

The Department of Management Information Systems (MIS) in the College of Business has proposed three new programs in applied data analytics: a Technical Certificate (TC), a Bachelor of Science (BS), and a Master of Science (MS). The new programs complement the department's existing Graduate Certificate (GC) in Data Analytics and are being created by "reconfiguration"—that is, by using primarily existing courses to create curricula that provide students with strong data analytics preparation at each of these new programmatic levels. These programs require no new courses at the undergraduate level and only two (one required, one a "selective") at the graduate level.

Data analytics is probably the fastest growing sector in technology today. The ability to collect, cleanse, analyze, and effectively use data for business purposes requires a toolbox full of skills and expertise. The field includes data management as well as descriptive, predictive, and prescriptive analytics and uses skills such as SQL, Python programming, R programming environment, Tableau, data mining, machine learning, advanced statistics, and others. The field—alternatively called data analytics or data science—is broad enough that it fits well into three different departments on campus: computer science and mathematics in the College of Natural Science and Mathematics and MIS in the College of Business.

These three new programs provide depth to the current offerings at UCA. Data analytics programs are becoming increasingly common in higher education, as universities attempt to address the shortfall in analytics professionals needed in organizations today. All three of these programs are STEM-coded programs that provide the skills necessary to work as analytics professionals.

All appropriate university councils and administrators have recommended adoption of this change.

Technical Certificate in Applied Data Analytics

Bachelor of Science in Applied Data Analytics

This undergraduate degree program is designed for students about to enter college or currently in college. This STEM degree provides undergraduates with a solid foundation and the critical skills to carry out analytics tasks. It includes a foundation in business which is important for context. As the business need for professionals grows, this program will grow as well. The field of analytics is growing rapidly enough that undergraduate degrees in analytics are critical, and support the recommendations of the Governor's Blue Ribbon Commission for Data Analytics and Computing (December 2017). This degree is gaining traction around the country, and most universities in Arkansas have such an undergraduate degree. While it is expected that undergraduate students already attending UCA will major in data analytics, we also expect that it will attract new students, who would not normally come to UCA.

I. DESCRIPTION OF AND JUSTIFICATION FOR CURRICULUM CHANGE

Currently MIS has three concentrations, in Application Development, Network & Systems Administration, and Business Analysis. Further, the Application Development Concentration has three sub-tracks (Programmer/Analyst, E-Commerce, and GIS), and students in this concentration must choose one of these sub-tracks. Application Development is a software-based track, Networking is hardware-based, and Business Analysis is analytics and statistics-based.

This change reduces the number of concentrations to two, by combining the Application Development and Network & Systems Administration concentrations. The new concentration will be called Computer Information Systems. This proposal makes no change to the Business Analysis Concentration. Combining the software and hardware concentrations into one is advantageous to both students and the department. For students, it permits them more choice in their plan of study. It allows students to combine programming with networking, if they choose. It makes scheduling easier for them by reducing the number of "required" courses, putting electives in their place ("Choose two of the following"). Based on their interest and goals, students will have more freedom to concentrate on software, hardware, or some combination of the two.

The change will allow the department to operate much more efficiently. Currently, there are required courses in each concentration and sub-track, and some of these courses have low enrollment. The added flexibility will mean the department does not have to teach these courses with the regularity it does now. Reducing the course teaching load is beneficial for scheduling and instructor utilization. It will be easier to pair faculty with their specialties. In addition, it will be much easier for advisors to counsel students, as this proposal greatly simplifies the major.

Notification: New Program, Bachelor of Science in Data Science

The Department of Computer Science in the College of Natural Sciences and Mathematics has proposed a new Bachelor of Science (BS) program in Data Science by reconfiguration—that is, by using primarily existing courses (one new course has been created for this program). The new program begins with the existing Computer Science/Data Science concentration and has been designed to meet the newly released Program Criteria for Data Science Programs from ABET's Computing Accreditation Commission. The reconfiguration is achieved by adding Mathematics courses that are crucial for Data Science; replacing the theoretical or systems-oriented Computer Science courses with Data Science courses; replacing the Computer Science capstone with a Data Science capstone; and replacing the category of Computer Science electives by concentrations so that each Data Science major can specialize in a specific application domain.

The proposed program will initially feature three concentrations: Computer Science (contributed by the Department of Computer Science), Statistics (contributed by the Department of Mathematics), and Business (contributed by the Department of Management Information Systems). The first two concentrations are contributed by the College of Natural Sciences and Mathematics and the third by the College of Business. In time, we expect other departments to contribute suitable Data Science concentrations to the program (e.g., a Bioinformatics concentration by the Department of Biology, a Cheminformatics concentration by the Department of Geography).

Curriculum Description and Summary

Description

Students will be introduced to market forces, supply and demand relationships, and decision making with scarce resources in the economics courses. They will then be introduced to all segments of personal finance topics (insurance, retirement related planning, investment, etc.) and get an overview of the financial markets and the commercial banking industry in the four required courses in the minor. Students can then pursue more in-depth knowledge though the choice of two electives that will build upon these four foundational courses. Students will be able to explain basic concepts related to financial services and be able to evaluate and analyze information related to the discipline in their selected financial services elective courses.

Summary

A minor in Financial Services requires 18 unique hours (that is, these 18 hours may not be used for any other major or minor). Students earning a BA or BS in Economics cannot earn this minor.

This proposal changes the name of the organizational unit from Department of Management Information Systems to Department of Computer Information Systems and Analytics (CISA). This unit is one of the four departments in the College of Business.

The change from "management" to "computer" corresponds with recent changes in our program emphasizing technical content across our upper-division courses. A more technical emphasis is also noted in the business environment today. Employers in Arkansas are interested in technical graduates, which has been recognized by the Governor of Arkansas in his Computer Science initiatives. All of the majors or programs in this department are technical in nature, including a BS in Information Systems, a BS in Cybersecurity Management, a BBA in Management Information Systems (soon to be renamed Computer Information Systems), a Graduate Certificate in Data Analytics. The addition of "Analytics" in the name change reflects an increased emphasis in data analytics. The department already has the graduate certificate as well as a concentration within the BBA MIS program in analytics. In addition, it is proposing a Technical Certificate, BS, and MS in Applied Data Analytics to begin Fall 2021. The department already teaches all the required courses in analytics, but the addition of the name "analytics" to the name of the department describes it much more accurately.

An additional consideration is perception. Most high school and college students have not heard of "MIS," but they know "Computer." We believe that many more students might choose a STEM major if they knew alternatives to Computer Science. Finally, technology departments within the various Colleges of Business are labeled differently. Some continue to use the name "MIS," but there is no naming standard common among most departments. UALR's department, for example, is named Business Information Systems; UA Fayetteville's is named Information Systems, and Arkansas State's is named Computer and Information Technology.

In short, the change to Department of Computer Information Systems and Analytics accurately describes the department and its program offerings, is more easily recognizable to potential students, and maintains recognition both in industry and academia.
