Danielle Felice Riede makes site-specific installations out of recuperated materials. She is the recipient of the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts Fellowship and the Virginia Commission for the Arts Fellowship in Sculpture and is currently an Associate Professor of Art at the Herron School of Art and Design - Indiana University Purdue University Indianapolis. Riede received an MFA in Painting from Virginia Commonwealth University and a BA in Art from the University of Virginia, as well as studying under Daniel Buren at the Kunstakademie Duesseldorf.

Dawn Holder, a sculptor and installation artist, investigates various elements of landscape and their socio-cultural significance through porcelain and mixed media. Holder was awarded an Arkansas Arts Council 2015 Individual Artist Fellowship Grant for sculpture and installation art and is an Assistant Professor of Art at the University of the Ozarks. She received an MFA in ceramics from the Rhode Island School of Design and a BFA in ceramics from the University of Georgia.

Langdon Graves' drawings and installations are steeped in folk traditions, mysticism and pseudoscientific exploration, and have been featured in Art News, Hyperallergic, Juxtapoz, Art F City and Blouin Artinfo. Graves attended the Fountainhead Residency in Miami, The Kunstenaarsinitiatief Residency and Exhibition program in the Netherlands and is a recipient of Canson & Beautiful Decay's Wet Paint Grant. She received her MFA from Parsons and her BFA from Virginia Commonwealth University.

Francine Kay made her New York debut at Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall as winner of the New York Pro Piano Competition and has performed extensively as a soloist and chamber musician in Europe, North America and Asia. Kay is currently a lecturer on Faculty at Princeton University. She received Bachelors and Masters degrees at the Juilliard School studying with Adele Marcus, the Artist Diploma from the Glenn Gould School, and received her Doctor of Musical Arts from SUNY Stony Brook under Gilbert Kalish. Her significant mentors include Leon Fleisher, Gyorgy Sebok, and Marek Jablonski.

Jeremy Zhu is a principal performing artist at the LORE Society for Performing Arts & Education, and also an artist faculty in violin, chamber music and ensemble at the LORE Academy for Performing Arts. He received his master's degree in Violin Performance and Literature from the Eastman School of Music. His teachers include John Celentano, Charles Castleman, Zvi Zeitlin, Carlo Novi (baroque violinist), Jean M. Barr, Malcolm Bilson, and members of the Cleveland Quartet. Subsequently, he had the privilege to be mentored by Donald Weilerstein.
