Elevating Health by Empowering Team-Based Whole-Person Care.

Collaboration and teamwork are often used interchangeably, but they have distinct differences. Collaboration refers to a group of individuals working together towards a common goal, but each person maintains their own responsibilities and decisions. In contrast, teamwork involves a group of individuals working together towards a common goal, and each person shares responsibility, decision-making, and accountability for the outcome.

The UCA Community Care Clinic is empowering providers to adopt a team-based care approach that prioritizes whole-person care. Whole-person care addresses each client's physical, mental, emotional, and social needs. It's inspiring to see this interprofessional group of health and wellness providers coming together to provide personalized care that addresses each client's unique needs and circumstances.

Through this model of care, we are also providing UCA students opportunities to engage in experiential learning that bridges the classroom to client treatment, helping them learn to provide team-based whole-person care. This training will be invaluable to the quality of health and wellness care our graduates provide in future clinical and community settings.

Our CHBS Advisory Board spotlight is UCA Alumnus Colonel Addie Drake Morris. After twenty-seven years of service, Colonel Addie Drake Morris received the Jeanette P. Grosickii's Nursing Honor Award during her enrollment in the University of Central Arkansas psychiatric nursing graduate program. As a member of the CHBS Advisory Board, Colonel Morris serves as a resource on specific health related issues and fills knowledge gaps in areas of her expertise. As an advocate of underserved communities, Colonel Morris used her nursing acumen to found "Drake Nurse's Charity", which provides health missions and education to areas in the Southern United States and other countries, including Haiti, Jamaica, and the Philippines. In 2021, Colonel Morris was instrumental in founding "The Hat and Glove Society" which is a social organization dedicated to preserving the social graces of the past while embracing the present and future with hope.
