ginia Association of College and University Officers (VACUHO) as President-elect, the Virginia Student Services Conference (VSSC) as the Chair of the Marketing Committee, the Southeastern Association of Housing Officers (SEAHO) on the AV Committee, and American College and University Housing Officers-International (ACUHO-I) on the Marketing Committee.

Rodney has formerly said that he would like to become a Director of Residence Life, but is now thinking that he would rather pursue an opportunity that would allow further growth and learning. He would like to work in a positive, supportive environment where he feels he can make a difference. Rodney stated that "title and position seem to matter less to me as I move further into my career. I guess it goes back to simply making a difference wherever you can for those that you interact with on a daily basis. Of course, I want to move up at some point, but it is not something that I am in a hurry to do."
