Courses Taught

AAAS 390: The Long Civil Rights Movement (2020)

This course examined the struggle for civil rights in the United States from an expanded perspective, chronologically and ideologically, by exploring five epochs: (1) civil rights involvement during the transition from slavery to freedom (1865-1910), (2) civil rights activism during the early twentieth century (1910-1950), (3) the classical phase of the Civil Rights Movement (1954-1965), the Black Power era (1965-1975) and finally, (5) the contemporary activism of the Black Lives Matter Movement.

AAAS 300: Survey in Africana Studies (2018-2019)

This course introduced students to the broad and dynamic field of African American & African Studies by examining key aspects of Black life in its current and historical unfolding. This course underscored the interlocking oppressions of race, class, gender, and sexuality while examining key topics of the discipline including African/African American history, Black women's history, Black feminist thought, Black queer theories, and the African diaspora.
