FACULTY RESEARCH HAPPENINGS

Dr. Rich took some time off last semester collecting data on the effects of homelessness on young women and children. The book is set in Arkansas, but tells an American story. Young women who have experienced homelessness in their lifetimes share firsthand experiences in childhood and adolescence. These include physical & sexual abuse, family instability, poverty, drug use, foster care, justice system involvement, mental and physical health, and survival trade involvement. An official title has not been announced yet, but we're all looking forward to the book's release.
